Homework Club making a difference


These events have been well

person who makes sure I'm comfortable at Oak Park. It's a quiet and safe neighborhood and people are friendly," Patria says.

When I met with Patria, she was still glowing with a smile on her face as she told me how she recently celebrated her 94th birthday on April 27th! The party included her daughters, grandsons, granddaughters and several great-

grandsons and granddaughters, friends and church members – all who helped bring the birthday party to her at her apartment. Patria states, "It was a birthday party to be remembered with delicious Puerto Rican food, singing and prayers and some of my favorite cake, tres leches!"

Patria maintains her independence with the assistance of her granddaughter who does her food shopping, and a home healthcare aide who checks in with Patria Monday through Saturday and helps clean the apartment, cooks and provides bathing assistance.

As the warmer weather approaches, Patria looks forward to getting outside on her front porch with her many friends and family who come and visit, share their stories and keep her beaming.

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making sure the children are completing their homework assignments, but it's important that they are taking the time to read on a regular basis. As a result, the Reading Challenge was developed. When we began, we weren't sure what course of action to take with the children considering that they were all of different ages and grade levels. Fortunately, we came up with an effective way to encourage them to read and reward them.

The Reading Challenge commits each child to dedicate at least 20 or more minutes to reading each day they attend the Homework Club. The goal is to read 10 books within a three-week period. We have created a chart to include each child's name on it for both sites to keep track of how many books the children are reading – this is where the students begin to experience the challenge! When the three-week period has ended and most of the children have met their goal of reading 10 books, the Club celebrates as a group with a pizza party! Children participating in the Homework Club – as well as their parents – appreciate the assistance and opportunity to strengthen reading skills.

One participant, Nataly says, "The people at the Homework Club help me with homework, so when I go home I'm free to watch television." Another participant, Deiby states, he generally doesn't like reading, but when he's at the Club, reading is a lot more fun, which encourages him to want to read more.

Parents applaud the Club, as well. One parent, Christy, says, "The Homework Club has been a real life saver – being onsite it's really convenient, so I don't have to worry about transportation or traffic." Additionally, a volunteer, Mrs. Cole, says she's pleased to see major improvements in participants' reading skills, especially with children who were struggling when they first came into the program. "The Club is truly helping these children," Cole states. "This year they are reading more fluently and have moved on to selecting books that are on their reading levels."

As program administrators, our hope is that each child who participates in this reading challenge becomes a stronger reader, reads daily and increases his or her love of reading. The parents have expressed their gratitude as this challenge has helped alleviate some of the fuss they receive from their children about bedtime reading. Now instead of fighting the request to read or listen to their parent read, they ask, "Can you read me one more book?"
